Welcome from BRISMES

It is a great pleasure to welcome you to this year's annual conference of the British Society for Middle East Studies (BRISMES) at Sussex University near Brighton.

The diversity of the papers being presented this year is a true reflection of our attempt to put "The Middle East in Global Perspective". In analysing events in the Middle East there is a tendency for journalists and other observers to consider the Middle East as a region in isolation from the rest of the world, when in reality the region has always been a hub of inter-connections through trade, empires and cultural exchange.

In reflection of modern global themes there is a strong emphasis this year on the interactions between arts, cinema, journalism (including citizen journalism) and political movements. Issues of multiple identities, including amongst exiles and outside influences on the region are also strong and I particularly welcome the inclusion of papers on gender issues. I hope you will be invigorated by this diversity in approach.

BRISMES is particularly pleased to be able to hold this year's annual conference at Sussex University to help underline the University's interest in Middle Eastern Studies. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the University of Sussex and Professor Matthew Cragoe of the School of History, Art History, and Philosophy for their continuous support. I would also like to thank Dr Hilary Kalmbach whose inspiration and hard work have helped make the conference possible, as well as her fantastic team, including project coordinator Amy Slonje.

The publisher's exhibition will again be a centre piece of the BRISMES annual conference with thanks to all the publishers who are taking part, and the Sussex team for their help in organising the exhibition.

Our keynote lecture will be given by Professor Asef Bayat of the University of Illionis, with the title '**After the Arab Spring**'. We have several other plenary sessions on the programme, including contributions from Professor Marilyn Booth of the University of Edinburgh, Professor Francis Robinson of Oxford, and Professor Mark Sedgwick of Aarhus University.

I would also like to draw your attention to the Pearson Memorial Lecture, sponsored by MELCOM International (the Middle East Libraries Committee), which will be held on Monday 16 June, at 2:30 in the afternoon. It will be given by Professor Ulrich Marzolph with the title **Printing as an agent of tradition: Printed materials in nineteenth-century Qajar Iran'**.

And this year, thanks to the help of the British Council and the Moroccan Embassy, we have a new innovation for a BRISMES conference: a screening of "They are the Dogs", an awardwinning film by Moroccan film-maker Hicham Lasri. Please join us at the Duke of York cinema on Sunday 15 June at 11 am for the UK premier of this film, followed by a question and answer session with the director. On Monday evening 16 June, after a buffet dinner, we will discuss Middle Eastern and North African cinema further in an event that includes a screening of the short film SOFIA and a panel including filmmaker Ani Lauri Boulahri, film star Bila Boulahri, and Dr Jamal Bahmad of Philipps University of Marburg. Thank you to Professor Martin Evans and Yasmin El Derby, the founder of the MENA Film Hub, for making these evens possible.

About the Sussex Middle East initiative

University of Sussex is hosting this event as part of its growing investment in the field of Middle Eastern Studies. Over the past two years, it has hired six new academics– a Chair in Israel Studies, two Lecturers in Middle Eastern History, a Lecturer in Philosophy, a Professor of Modern History, and a Professor of Anthropology – to join its ten existing Middle East specialists.

At its founding, the University of Sussex engaged in innovative, multi-disciplinary study of multiple world regions. Schools such as African and Asian Studies, European Studies, and English and American Studies brought together academics with strong disciplinary backgrounds to engage in teaching and research focused on specific areas of the world. Since then, however, the university has shifted to a disciplinary-focused school structure, which distributed regional specialists into departments across the university.

The university is in the process of founding a Middle East Centre that will help the university recapture and expand upon its area studies legacy, enabling it to make a significant contribution to the study of the Middle East in the United Kingdom and Europe. This centre will consolidate and expand upon research and international partnership activities, as well as introduce innovative teaching programmes, related to the study of the Middle East, broadly conceived.

The centre combines a focus on the region with strong ties to specific disciplines, enabling us to consider critically what particular disciplines bring to regional studies, and vice-versa, with the goal of advancing debates in both. It places the Middle East in a global context, examining connections between individual countries and sub-regions within the Middle East and ties between the Middle East and other parts of the world, as well as how the Middle East fits into wider transnational, global, and international networks. It has an especially wide geographic scope, as it brings together academics studying contexts stretching from North Africa to Afghanistan, and Turkey to Sudan and the Indian Ocean coast, as well as Muslims in Europe. Its core of academics study the Arabic-speaking Middle East from 1800 onwards, but it also integrates the study of North Africa and Israel within the umbrella of Middle Eastern Studies. Finally, the centre's research and teaching programmes include an emphasis on application of knowledge, and engagement with educators, policymakers, and business interests.

How to get to University of Sussex from Brighton

Train

Falmer train station is directly opposite the University campus. Pedestrian access is through a subway under the A27 - follow signs for the University of Sussex (the University of Brighton has a campus at Falmer too). Falmer is on the line between Brighton and Lewes, about eight minutes' travel time in each direction. Four trains an hour go there during the day time. Visitors travelling via London and the west should take a train to Brighton and change there for Falmer.

Local buses

The 23, 25, 28 and 29 buses run between the centre of Brighton and the University, bringing you directly to campus. You can catch a bus from the Old Steine in Brighton; the 25 also runs from Churchill Square. The 28 and 29 go from the Old Steine and stop right outside the



University campus on their way to Lewes and beyond. Travel time is about 20-30 minutes. Bus timetables and information is available from Brighton buses. *Jubilee Building bus stop*: Bramber House

Taxi

Taxis are available at both Brighton and Lewes train stations and at many places in the centre of Brighton. It is about four miles (six kilometres) from central Brighton to the University. (There is no taxi service at Falmer station itself.) It is often quicker to catch the train to Falmer from Brighton or Lewes.

How to get to the Jubilee Building once on the Sussex campus




If travelling by rail, take the train from Falmer and get off at Brighton station. From there it's a 10 minute walk (see map on the right).
