Cultures of Colonialism



This course examines colonial practices, discourses and cultures across the nineteenth century British Empire. It examines European metropoles and their settler colonies in particular within a single analytical framework, tracking the exchange of people, ideas and objects along the networks that connected them.



Content

The first part of the course examines the main approaches to the study of British colonialism: traditional imperial history, postcolonialism, 'new' imperial history and historical geographies of empire. Student-led presentations then investigate colonial practices, discourses and cultures at specific sites across the empire including the West Indies, India, southern Africa, Australia, New Zealand and Britain itself.

Weeks 1-4: Introductory lectures


Weeks 5-11: Student-led seminar presentations followed by dissection and discussion

Assessment:




