Vending machines offering convenient STI testing could revolutionise sexual health

<u>A ground-breaking study from Brighton and Sussex Medical School and</u> <u>others</u> has proved that vending machines dispensing self-test kits for sexually transmitted infections are an effective way of reaching those who rarely or never get tested. The results of the year-long pilot programme suggest the machines should be integrated into the digital landscape of sexual health services.
