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Miss Represented – Brighton Dome

Miss Represented (aged 13–21) perform a *work-in-progress* as they develop a new production to take on tour in 2017. This will feature some excerpts from their sell-out show *Home:Life* which explored experiences of being young and homeless with little or no support system. Miss Represented works with young women facing challenging life situations using the arts for self-expression, developing self-worth, building resilience and discovering purpose and passions. Miss Rep's bespoke sessions result in cross-art exhibitions and performances that reach out into the community embracing common ground, asking questions and sparking a dialogue.

Glyndebourne Youth Opera – Glyndebourne

Members of **Glyndebourne Youth Opera** (aged 14–19) will perform extracts from the critically-acclaimed youth opera *Nothing*, which had its premiere at Glyndebourne in February 2016. It tells the haunting story of a group of teenagers trying to convince their classmate that life has meaning. Things quickly escalate as the adolescents go to ever more extreme lengths to attempt to persuade their friend that there are things worth caring about. Every year Glyndebourne Youth Opera provides young people living locally to Glyndebourne with open-access opera workshops and world-class performance opportunities.

Modelling Change – Thames Valley Partnership

Running between October 2014 to May 2016, **Modelling Change** used the creative arts to engage and empower girls (aged 16 to 19) in Oxfordshire. Skilled artist facilitators led a mix of arts based activities and workshops on a weekly basis. Through creative activity the project aimed to have a positive impact on the girls' self-esteem and self-image, ultimately steering them towards more positive life decisions.

Youth Navigators – Turner Contemporary

Turner Contemporary's Youth Navigators programme seeks to develop the skills, confidence and employment prospects of young people (aged 14-19). It uses philosopher-led discussion to enable people to develop listening, thinking and clear communication skills. At the same time, the project promotes community cohesion, while also challenging stereotypes about Margate, Thanet.

Monday Club and Thursday Club – Little Green Pig

Little Green Pig is a creative writing and mentoring charity for children and young people, working in Brighton & Hove and Sussex in areas of high deprivation. Through innovative writing programmes both in and out of school, they use writing to build self-confidence, literacy and communication skills. They will be showcasing and discussing the work of their Monday and Thursday clubs, including the innovative 'Street Stories' audio tour.

Transitions Project and others – Our Future City

'Transitions Project' is one of a growing number of **Our Future City** projects which uses creativity to improve the well being of young people across Brighton & Hove. This project, based in a secondary school in Brighton, works with a small group of year 7 pupils to support their adjustment to the transition to secondary school, using visual arts and sculpture to build their confidence, pride and self-worth.









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
