#### RESEARCH COMMUNITY

The Childhood and Youth PhD is supported and energized by the interdisciplinary Centre for Innovation and Research in Childhood and Youth (CIRCY). CIRCY offers a home to all staff and students interested in children, childhood and youth to support academic development, give impetus to proactive and responsive interdisciplinary research bidding, and provide an interdisciplinary critical friendship to those engaged in academic writing - for the thesis itself, for academic publications, or writing for public engagement. This mission goes along CIRCY's role in connecting with the wider community of scholars, practitioners and policy-makers in this field locally, nationally and globally.

Our researchers come from a wide variety of countries, educational settings and backgrounds. Our interests include the child's/young person's voice, perspective and agency; their social, emotional and material worlds; their safety, wellbeing, and needs; childhood/youth as a social, cultural, legal, political and/or historical phenomenon; and child, family or intergenerational relations.

Doctoral researchers are strongly encouraged to engage proactively not only with the dedicated CIRCY doctoral researchers' network, but with all wider CIRCY activities.

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## **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

If you'd like to join us as a researcher, there are two main routes (see back page for details), either of which can be taken full-or part time.

The +3 route is suited to those with an academic background at Masters level in an appropriate discipline. To join the +3 route you will need to demonstrate sufficient prior research training and/or relevant professional/research experience.

Whichever route you opt for, you are required to submit an initial research proposal outlining your area of research interest and what makes the proposed study a worthwhile and feasible one.

#### **ASSESSMENT**

The research proposal developed in the first year of the PhD will be reviewed by academic staff before permission to undertake fieldwork is granted.

Annual reviews of your progress and training needs are conducted.

Final assessment is through submission of an 80,000 word thesis which is judged by an internal and an external examiner. The examination process includes a *viva voce* in which you will give an oral defence of your work.

#### For the 1+3 route

A grade of B+ or higher in the dissertation of the MSc in Social Research Methods is required for progression to the PhD course.

# Example timeline for doctoral study

#### + 3 Route

The +3 PhD route is for applicants who can demonstrate sufficient relevant professional experience, or previous significant research methods training.

Researchers are encouraged to fulfill specific training needs through the undertaking of selected modules from the MSc in Social Research Methods.
