RESEARCH

ESRC GCRF RESEARCH ON TACKLING CANCER CARE IN AFRICA

Joanna Chataway and Chux Daniels are co-investigators in a recently awarded ESRC research grant titled "GCRF Inclusive Societies: How to link industrial and social innovation for inclusive development: lessons from tackling cancer care in Africa". Other institutions involved in the research consortium include the Open University UK, University of Edinburgh UK, and the Kenyan Medical Research Institute.

PROMOTING RELEVANT SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, AND INNOVATION IN KENYA, TANZANIA, AND RWANDA

SPRU is working in partnership with the African Centre for Technology Studies (<u>ACTS</u>) and The Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation (<u>CSIRO</u>) to understand how knowledge systems can promote science, technology, and innovation in three African countries: Kenya, Tanzania, and Rwanda. POVERTY PATHWAYS AND AGRICULTURAL TRANSFORMATION IN KENYA AND SOUTH INDIA

Global poverty compounds as climate-related events, political-religious conflicts, and growth inequality combine with social exclusion based on gender, race, and class. This project explores new ways of understanding complex pathways in and out of poverty in order to illustrate disadvantaged people's capacity for transformative change. TRANSFORMATIVE INNOVATION POLICY CONSORTIUM - START OF FIVE YEAR PROGRAMME

SPRU-Africa team is involved in the Transformative Innovation Policy Consortium (TIPC), a global partnership aiming to transform innovation policies. In May 2018, the TIPC officially launched a <u>Five Year Programme</u>. SPRU's co-founding members are Colombia, Norway, South Africa, Sweden, and Finland. SPRU COLLABORATES WITH UNCTAD IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF STI POLICY MANUALS

In 2017, SPRU's <u>Chux Daniels</u> was part of the international team of experts on the United Nations Convention on Trade and Development's <u>UNCTAD</u> Innovation Policy Learning Programme. The team is responsible for the development and review of UNCTAD's STI Policy Training Manuals for Policymakers in Low and Middle Income Countries. SPRU AND UNIVERSITY OF PRETORIA COLLABORATE ON STUDENT SUPERVISION

With the aim of strengthening research and policy collaborations with African, SPRU faculty <u>Joanna Chataway</u> and <u>Chux Daniels</u> will be working with the Graduate School of Technology Management (GSTM), <u>University of Pretoria</u>, South Africa, in the delivery of GSTM's STI Policy Module and in the co-supervision of MSc students and Doctoral thesis. POLICY ENGAGEMENTS

TRANSFORMATIVE INNOVATION POLICY CONSORTIUM IN AFRICA - UPDATES FROM SOUTH AFRICA, GHANA, NIGERIA AND ETHIOPIA

South Africa has recently developed a white paper on STI in order to ensure its National Systems of Innovation (NSI) respond to "megatrends" such as the next industrial revolution, the increasing pressure on the environment, the issues of rapid urbanisation, and the population imbalance that is favourable to young people. Reflecting on the Department of Science and Technology in South Africa's participation in TIPC, Deputy Director-General Imraan Patel said, "The refreshed White Paper is grounded on the need to accelerate inclusion and transformation in a rapidly changing world. This requires new thinking and policy experimentation with national and international research and policy partners."

Relatedly, SPRU organised a two-day workshop for countries aspiring to join TIPC. The workshop, convened in partnership with the Ghanaian STI Policy Research Institute (STEPRI), took place in April 2018 at Accra. Participants include policymakers, researchers, innovation practitioners, and civil society actors from Ghana, Ethiopia and Nigeria. Similar events being planned to take place in the future, will involve more African countries.

UPCOMING EVENTS: JULY - DECEMBER 2018

- **5 July** Prospects for Innovation and Development: Remembering and Celebrating Calestous Juma. <u>Professor Juma</u> completed his MSc and PhD at SPRU in the 1980s. SPRU will hold a special memorial workshop in his honour, with participants from across the globe.
- 12-14 July Perspectives on research excellence in the Global South, Johannesburg, South Africa. - 24-26 October Globelics International Conference, Accra, Ghana. SPRU Faculty presenting are Chux Daniels and Joanna Chataway.
- **5-7 November** Science Granting Council Initiative's <u>call for papers</u>. The November meeting's theme is on "New Approaches for Funding Research and Innovation in Africa", Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire. SPRU colleagues will be in attendance.
- 12-14 December Science Forum, South Africa, a platform for igniting discussions on science, technology, innovation, and policy.
