## Guided Walk: the Buildings of Lewes - Friday 8th October (FULL)

Our next outdoor event, hosted by Marcus Taylor and already full, will be a guided walk of the buildings of Lewes. The walk takes about an hour and a half at a gentle pace.

It will start at 10.30am by the war memorial at the eastern end of Southover Church and ends in Cliffe, the area to the east of the river and takes in a range of building materials on the way.



A talk (campus seminar room and live-streaming) by Jan Nawrocki "How Surgeons Think": 25th November 2021, 5.30 -6.30pm.

Lockdown in 2020/21 deprived us of this fascinating talk by Jan Nawrocki, Consultant Urological Surgeon at Brighton and Sussex University Hospitals NHS Trust.

Jan has held posts of Director of Medical Education, Associate Dean and, more recently, President of the European Board of Urology, on whose executive he still sits.

After research on the treatment of prostate disease and many years as a practicing surgeon, he has recently directed his attention to the way the attitudes of surgeons influence medical practice and education. In 2019, he was awarded a doctorate in English and Humanities from the University of London for his thesis entitled 'An exploration of the negative dispositions that influence the judgement of doctors: Pride, vanity, and practice'.



His illustrated talk (which will be a hybrid talk - campus seminar room and live-streaming) will consider the everyday work of practicing surgeons. Specialist skills and knowledge grounded in science are central for any doctor, but judgement is of prime importance. His account of some of the many factors that influence this judgement will be of interest both to those who have already been surgical patients and those who may face surgery in the future.

## Spotlight on... James Hirschfeld

The Suss-Ex Newsletter team was very pleased to see an article about Professor James Hirschfeld featuring in the University's "This Sussex Life" series over September.

In addition to being a long-standing member of the Suss-Ex Club, James's career has spanned the first decade of the University's establishment right up to the present day - in fact, it is now probably the case that he currently holds the record as the longest serving employee of the University!





James joined the Maths Department in 1966, went on to become Dean of Maths and Physics from 1988 to 1992, has received prestigious awards for his research, and now funds an annual University prize named after him. Not only this, but he speaks fluent Italian, plays excellent golf, and Suss-Ex hopes we can persuade him to give us another expert wine-tasting session.

The photo on the left, by Charles Goldie, shows James (on the left) with Martin Dunwoody, a colleague who later left for the University of Southampton, on the Newhaven-Dieppe ferry in September 1970. James, Martin and Charles shared the driving of Charles's Renault 4 all across

France, to and from the International Congress of Mathematicians in Nice.


# Ridgeview Winery visit: don't mind if I do

# The Kindness Test – take part!

As former employees of the University, we take a special interest in the research being undertaken. It's difficult to pick out any particular field for special mention but from time to time something bubbles to the top of the national agenda and grabs our attention.

So it is with "The Kindness Test Project", a study being led by <u>Professor Robin Banerjee</u> (Head of the School of Psychology) in partnership with BBC Radio 4. It is one of many research initiatives based in the interdisciplinary research network – <u>Sussex Kindness Research</u> and it is the biggest ever public science project on this topic!



You can help the findings by completing an <u>on-line questionnaire</u> - it should take about 30 minutes to complete. The results will be analysed and then announced on BBC Radio 4 in February 2022, with the findings informing subsequent research and publications in scientific journals.
