Isabelle Stengers (Universite Libre de Bruxelles) in a recent Public Discussion at CRESC Annual Conference claimed that for academics to reclaim their practice, they would need to become a resistance movement in the face of the new barbarism that is upon us, convince themselves and others, colleagues and students alike, that resistance is possible.

In the second seminar we will discuss the struggle for reparation in Afrika through the eyes of a lawyer who worked on the Mau Mau case in Kenya, and an activist in the movement for slavery reparation, asking whether post-colonialism has happened.
