Researching Educational Practice Conference

Saturday 18 June 2022 / 9.30am-1pm / Venue details tbc

This CTLR hosted conference will include short presentations delivered by Education MA and International Education and Development students, and also ESW Doctoral Researchers on the broad theme of teacher development and practice spanning education 3-18 years in the UK and globally.

Presentations will be followed by opportunities to engage in facilitated discussion.

The conference will begin with a keynote presentation delivered by Meg Maguire, Professor of the Sociology of Education, Kings College London, on 'Why should we research educational practice and what should we be doing?'

The starting point for this discussion is based on raising questions about why we should be researching educational practice. Is it to help policy-makers and governments reform provision? Is it to help teachers 'do' their work better and sustain them in this role? Is it to identify what works and what does not work well?

Drawing on funded and unfunded research into and about educational practice that explores both institutional settings and different types of practitioners, this discussion will be arguing for more scope for 'complexity, resisting homogeneity, and recovering 'lost' histories (Ozga, 2000, p.131). What we should be doing needs to trouble, discomfort and possibly disrupt some of the current orthodoxies that shape what counts as educational research.
