Chancellor selects honorary graduands

Six "Sussex people" are to be awarded honorary degrees by the University at a special ceremony in July incorporating the Silver Jubilee Graduation Ceremony and the installation of the new Chancellor, the Earl of March and Kinrara.

In keeping with tradition, the honorary graduands are the personal choice of the new Chancellor on the occasion of his installation. Lord March, who is the elder son and heir of the ninth Duke of Richmond and Gordon, devotes much of his time to running the family estates at Goodwood, including the world-famous race course, and is a prominent Anglican layman, has selected six people who have strong links with Sussex and the University.

Lord March is the University's third Chancellor. His predecessor, Lord Shawcross, who was elected in 1965 following the death of the first Chancellor, Lord Monckton of Brechley, stood down in August 1985 after 20 years in office.

Student anger over grants

The Students' Union and University officers joined last week in condemning the announcements made on student grants and welfare benefits by the Government during the Christmas break.

Education Secretary, Sir Keith Joseph, told Parliament on December 16, 1985 that the main rates of student grant will be increased by around two per cent for the next academic year.

On the same day the White Paper on Social Security was published, containing provisions to remove students' entitlement to supplementary and unemployment benefits during the Christmas and Easter vacations, to discontinue the payment of housing benefit to students in halls of residence, and to limit the amount of housing benefit paid to students during the summer vacation for accommodation from which they are absent. It also included a proposal to restore the law

Maths Master Classes

For the third consecutive year the Education Development Building buzzed with the working of children's brains on ten Saturday mornings last term as forty-one 12 and 13 year olds selected from schools throughout Sussex attended the annual series of Royal Institution Mathematics Master Classes.

The classes, which were sponsored by ICL Computers plc and organised by the local branch of the Mathematical Association, were designed to give children the chance to work on various types of mathematical problems which give an insight into modern mathematics but which are not covered by schools.

Principal lecturer for the series was Mr. Alan Tammadge, former president of the Mathematical Association and a former headmaster of Sevenoaks School. His talks covered such areas as topology, algebra, number theory and geometry.

Other sessions were given by Mr. Joe Taylor and Dr. Dudley Ward of the Mathematics Subject Group on microcomputers and the mathematics of chess boards, and by Professor John Crank, formerly of Brunel University, on applied mathematics. Teacher tutors, including several members of the Mathematics Division, were present at all sessions.

concerning covenants to students so that they cover only the grant-aided period, not the full year.

The changes are due in the academic year 1986-87, except for the restriction in Summer vacation housing benefit which will apply from June this year.

To compensate for the loss of benefits, Social Services Secretary, Mr. Norman Fowler, announced last week that means tested grants for undergraduates and full grants for postgraduates will be increased by £36 per year.

Students' Union Vice-President (Social Services), Paul Bish, expressed student anger last week and said, "We are absolutely horrified. The increase is no use at all to us, bearing inflation in mind. We expect to lose anything up to £500 per year in real terms."

Finance Officer, Ray Howard, commented, "The University is very concerned at the further cut in the real level of student support contained in this announcement, and believe there is a danger of real hardship amongst a significant part of the student body."

Sir Keith also announced that the parental contribution scale for 1986-87 will be adjusted upwards in line with earnings. This means that those parents with a residual income of less than £8,700 will not have to pay anything in contribution, while those with a residual income of £28,000 or more will pay the maximum contribution of £4,300.

As well as being a Professor of Chemistry at Sussex, he is a former chief scientific adviser to the Ministry of Defence and is now a scientific adviser to the Home Office.

PROFESSOR MIKE THOMPSON

Professor Thompson, a former Pro-Vice-Chancellor and Acting Vice-Chancellor of Sussex, and currently Vice-Chancellor of the University of East Anglia, is on the move again - he has been appointed to the Vice-Chancellorship of Birmingham.

DR. KEITH OATLEY

Dr. Oatley, Lecturer in Experimental Psychology, has been appointed to a second Chair in Psychology at the University of Glasgow.

PROFESSOR B.V. JAYAWANT

Professor Jayawant has been elected Vice-Chairman of the Computing and Control Divisional Board of the Institution of Electrical Engineers and will be chairman of the Division in 1989-90. This Division is one of the five learned society activity boards of the IEE.

MRS. PAULINE THORNE

Mrs. Thorne, Alumni Clerk in Sussex House, has been elected to chair the South Eastern District Council of NALGO, which represents 38,000 members in Kent, Surrey and Sussex. She is the first woman and probably the youngest person to occupy the post.

MR. PHILIP LARKIN

The poet Philip Larkin, who died on December 2, was an honorary graduate of Sussex. He received an Hon.DLitt from the University in 1974.

Award for Sussex historian

Sussex historian, Professor John Röhl, has received international recognition of his contribution to historical scholarship with a prestigious double award.

Professor Röhl, Professor of History in the School of European Studies and Dean of the School from 1982-85, has been elected to a fellowship at the Historisches Kolleg in Munich for the academic year 1986-87. Only three fellows are elected to the Kolleg at any one time and by tradition two of these are awarded to historians from Germany. The third place, awarded to Professor Röhl, is open to historians from the rest of the world.

In addition to his fellowship, Professor Röhl has been awarded the Prize of the Stiftung Historisches Kolleg, worth 20,000 DM (around £5,300), in recognition of his work on the decision-making processes and power structures of Imperial Germany before the First World War, a topic which has interested him since he graduated from Cambridge in 1961.

His main publication to date is a three-volume work entitled "The Kaiser's closest friend for 20 years, Prince Philipp zu Eulenburg", which took him 17 years to complete.

The Historisches Kolleg fellowships, which are much sought after in the German historical world, allow historians a twelve-month period during which they can concentrate their attention on writing, unhindered by teaching or other commitments. The Kolleg itself, a large villa in the centre of Munich, contains only the three fellows and a number of secretaries. During his year there Professor Röhl hopes to complete his biography of Kaiser Wilhelm II.

However Professor Röhl will have two obligations during his time there. He is required to give a public lecture in Munich on a subject of his choice. He is also required to organise a conference on the subject on which he is working, to which he can invite, at the Kolleg's expense, any specialist in that subject from anywhere in the world.

Academic tenure

New laws to limit job tenure for university lecturers have been proposed in a consultation paper published by the Government last month.

The proposed changes would give universities the power to dismiss staff because of redundancy or for financial reasons. This would not apply retrospectively but to new appointments and to permanent academic staff who are promoted.

In order not to interfere with the mobility of academic staff, those moving to another university job of the same grade would be able to retain tenure.

The consultation paper proposes the appointment of three commissioners with powers to make new university statutes or to amend existing ones. It is proposed that before doing this the commissioners should be required to consider any representations from people affected by the legislation. The commissioners would be empowered to incorporate provisions to safeguard academic freedom, defined as "freedom to research, publish and teach without being subject to victimisation because of the nature or content of what is researched."

The proposed new laws provide for the review of existing "good cause" provisions for the dismissal of academic staff and that any amendments should apply to all the academic staff and not, as with the amendments to tenure, to those appointed after a specified date.

The Association of University Teachers and the Committee of Vice-Chancellors & Principals have been asked for their views by the end of February.

Access to Arts D by ambulance or fire engine is being prevented by drivers parking their cars on the road to the rear of the building. Those who are causing this obstruction should be aware that they are putting lives and property at risk and are asked to seek alternative parking locations.

McCowen stars in New Year line-up

The new year comes alive at the Gardner Centre with a programme full of excitement and variety - Alec McCowen as Kipling, cabaret from Harvey and the Wallbangers, a Beethoven series, a mime season and blues from Louisiana Red.

Alec McCowen's Kipling received universal acclaim while playing a highly successful run at London's Mermaid Theatre. It comes to the Gardner as part of a short national tour during January, and is a particularly appropriate production. Kipling had a close local association with Rottingdean, while 1986 is the fiftieth anniversary of his death, and his papers are one of the special collections in the University Library.

Alec McCowen is one of Britain's finest and most popular actors, with a host of stage, film and television credits. He has worked with such diverse names as Sir Laurence Olivier, Peter Brook and Alfred Hitchcock. Kipling is written by Brian Clark, author of the West End hit 'Whose Life is it Anyway?', and is based on Kipling's own poetry and prose. The show gives a fascinating and often surprising insight into his life and work. McCowen has performed the show on Broadway as well as in the West End, and it has also been broadcast on Channel 4. 'Kipling' is at the Gardner from January 16 to 18.

Thunderbirds are go again as the Gardner's mime season gets under way with a hilarious and affectionate parody of the classic TV puppet series. All your favourite characters (and spaceships) from International Rescue are brought back to life and there's a special guest appearance from Captain Scarlet. Mime Theatre Project presents Thunderbirds on January 14 and 15.

The season continues with Teatro Chileno de Mimos on January 23 to 25. Gloria Romo, Jaime Schneider and Francisco Morales were three of South America's leading performers until the 1973 coup in Chile forced their exile. Since then they have performed throughout the

world as actors and mime artists, but their work together has been seen only rarely in Britain. They present a double bill titled 'In The Middle of Nowhere'.

Two of Britain's leading mime artists, Nola Rae and John Mowat, join forces for the last show of the season titled 'Loggerheads'. Both have toured the world and made numerous television appearances. Together they produce a show full of dazzling virtuosity, exploring the innate human capacity for disagreement. Nola and John are at 'Loggerheads' from January 30 to February 1.

Harvey and the Wallbangers bring their brand new show 'Park The Tiger' to the Gardner on January 22, fresh from a London run at the Bloomsbury Theatre. The show is directed by David Gilmore, whose West End credits include 'Daisy Pulls It Off' and 'The Hired Man'. The script has been devised by Geoffrey Perkins, producer of 'The Hitch-Hiker's Guide to the Galaxy', writer of Radio-Active and currently script editor of 'Spitting Image'. The Wallbangers promise an evening of music and humour, new and familiar songs, jazz, doo-wop and rock 'n' roll.

The Gardner's spring Beethoven series begins on January 21 with a concert from the Chilingirian String Quartet, whose programme also includes Schubert's Quartetsetz and a rare chance to hear Alban Berg's Lyric Suite.

The Quartet will be giving lunchtime lecture recitals and open rehearsals this term, as well as a master class tomorrow, January 14, 3 - 6 p.m., at which observers will be welcome.

The Beethoven series continues on January 29 when the distinguished violinist Erich Gruenberg gives the first of three recitals in which he will play all ten of Beethoven's violin sonatas. The other recitals are on February 12 and 26.

An innovation at the Gardner, Saturday morning jazz workshops, begins on January 18, and on February 4 the legendary American blues singer Louisiana Red appears in concert.

Still Life, an exhibition treating aspects of contemporary still life photography, is in the gallery from January 22, and there will be a special talk on the exhibition at 2 p.m. on January 29. Admission is free.
