Andrew Pickup Award – September 2023

Introduction

I would like to extend my deepest gratitude to the Andrew Pickup Award, which allowed me to complete a research placement in Japan at NPO WELgee, based in Tokyo. This placement was a crucial aspect of my research, which focused on understanding the emerging complementary pathway for asylum-seekers and refugees in Japan, co-created by NPOs and the private sector.

Research Overview

This research is one of the first attempts to discover the emerging phenomena of nonprofit organisations (NPOs) creating a complementary pathway by facilitating the employment of asylum-seekers and refugees as high-skilled workers in Japan, historically known for its stringent refugee policies. Taking a case study at NPO WELgee, the sole advocator for "refugees as talents" in Japan, this study explores the motivations behind companies hiring refugees who are not immediately "ready-to-work", the NPO's dynamic process with the employers in co-creating new positions, and the state's stance on this new pathway. Primary narratives are obtained through semi-structured qualitative interviews with eleven NPO staff and pro-bonos, three corporate executives and one staff from the government-related organisation to capture the ongoing phenomenon.

Research Question

 What role did the non-profit organisations (NPOs) play in influencing the companies to make new job positions for refugees and creating a new pathway to stabilise their visas?

Fund Usage

The bursary fund was utilised to cover my plane ticket, bus tickets and lodging during the three months I spent in Tokyo to conduct my placement in person. During the three months, I completed a participatory observation of 11 participants from WELgee and 15 qualitative interviews with members from NPOs, companies and government-related organisations, shaping the main body of my research. I could also attend several key events and company visits in person, which provided networking opportunities to find interview participants and a tangible understanding of the dynamics and relationships between the NPOs, companies, Japanese government agencies, and international organisations surrounding asylum-seeker and refugee employment.

As one of the first attempts to cover asylum-seekers and refugee's employment issues in Japan, the dissertation will be circulated among the supporters of WELgee and shared through multiple channels to raise awareness regarding the refugee issue in Japan, which is not very well-known to the general public. The outcome is also used to encourage more employers to hire displaced people and promote economic inclusion of asylum-seekers and refugees through sharing good practices by the pioneering companies.

This research owes its existence to the Andrew Pickup award bursary and the strong support and encouragement from Su Richards, the Global Studies placement coordinator. My physical presence in Tokyo allowed me to develop a professional and personal network with NPO members, corporations and government agencies working in asylum-seeker and refugee employment. Participating in formal and informal conversations and activities with these leading members helped me dive deeper into an insider view of emerging phenomena.

Going forward

Moving forward, I aim to pursue my career surrounding migrant labour mobility and promoting refugee economic inclusion. I would like to build on the knowledge obtained through this research placement and experience in engagement and partnerships with the private sector at my internship. I express profound gratitude for the invaluable scholarship and the remarkable generosity extended by the family of Andrew Pickup, which has enabled my physical presence in Tokyo, where I had the privilege to engage with interview participants and access resources that shaped the main body of my research.
