Inspired by essays written by schoolchildren in 1930s Bolton, collected by the research organisation Mass-Observation and now archived at The Keep in Sussex, I am working alongside local heritage stakeholders in Greater Manchester to engage children from deprived communities in innovative co-created learning experiences. Year five children in one school, for example, were inspired to write their own essays mirroring those written by schoolchildren at the same school in the 1930s, and they produced a video of their work: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4VNGDc-oOEM

In collaboration with Bolton Museum and local teachers, we are currently working to develop a much wider cross-curricular scheme of work for the Key Stage 2 history curriculum.
