

The First World War and Modern Jewry Derek Penslar

Nearly one and a half million Jews served in the armed forces of the Allied and Central Powers during the First World War. Many fought because they had no choice, but others served willingly, eager to demonstrate their loyalty, courage, and worthiness for acceptance. This lecture will focus on the conflict Jewish soldiers felt between duty to their country and solidarity towards fellow Jews across the battle line. This tension continued to haunt Jewish veterans into the interwar years, fueling responses as varied as Zionism, communism, and desperate patriotism.

This public lecture is part of a conference on the 'Jewish Experience of the First World War.'
By bringing together junior and more



established scholars from a range of different disciplines, the conference aims to provide the setting for an in-depth discussion on the place and multifaceted meanings of the First World War for our understanding of the Jewish experience of the modern era.

Derek Penslar, FRSC is a comparative historian with interests in the relationship between modern Israel and diaspora Jewish societies, global nationalist movements, European colonialism and post-colonial states. In 2012, he became the first Stanley Lewis professor of Israel studies at the University of Oxford. He is a member of the Department of Politics and International Relations and the School of Interdisciplinary Area Studies, and a fellow of St Anne's College. Prof. Penslar's areas of research expertise include modern European Jewry, Zionism and Israel.
