

How long do I need to self-isolate for?

If someone in your house or flat develops symptoms of Covid-19

If someone in your house or flat falls ill or tests positive, the whole household needs to isolate for 10 full days.

If a second flatmate gets sick or tests positive, the rest of the flat does not need to restart their self-isolation as long as this happens within the 10-day isolation period.

If the first person to get sick tests negative for Covid-19 from a PCR test taken within the first seven days of developing symptoms, then the flat isolation can end, as long as no one else has developed symptoms.

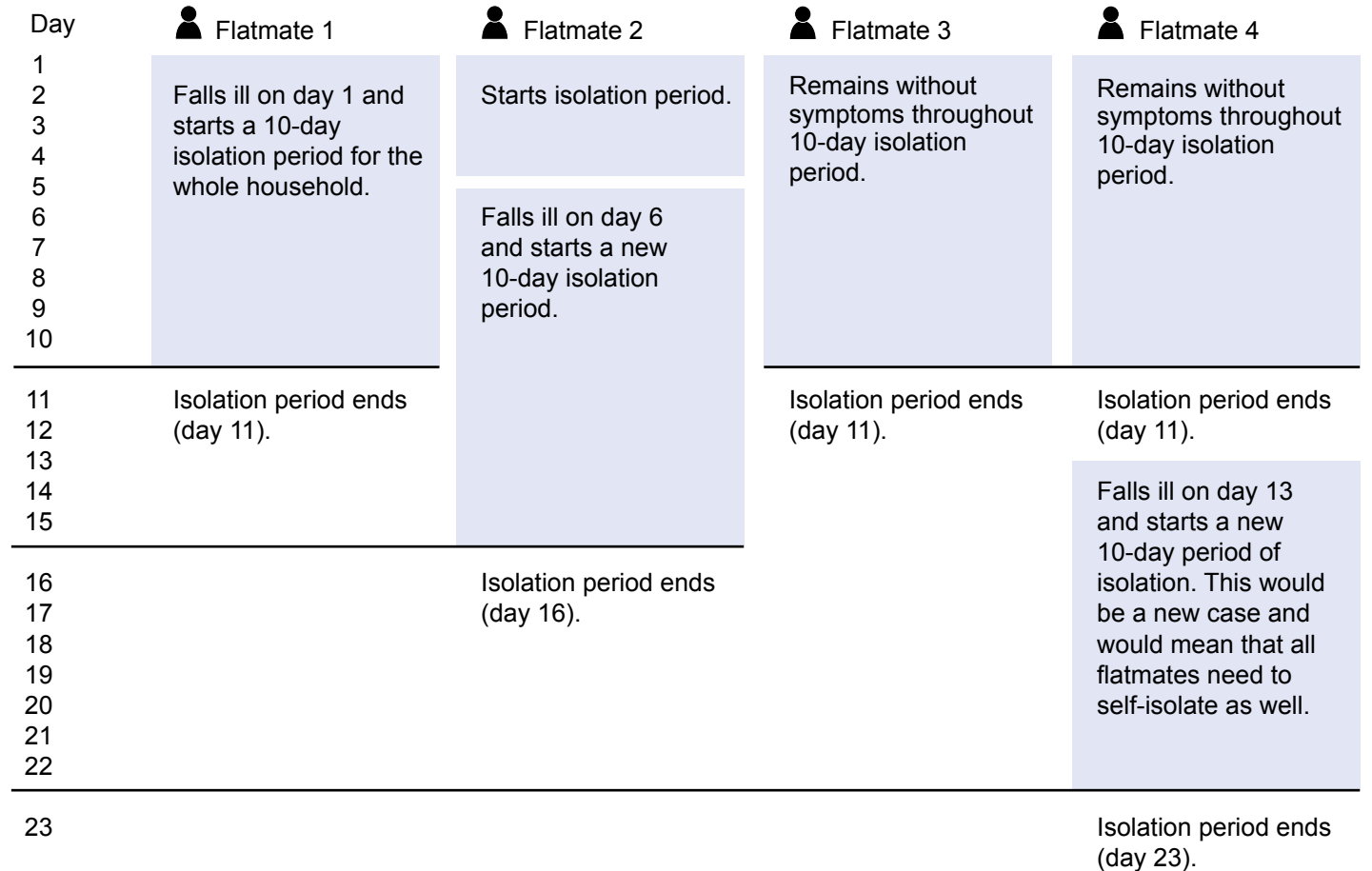

After your isolation period ends

If, at the end of your isolation, you still have a high temperature, you must remain in isolation and should seek medical advice from the NHS 112 number.

For on-campus housing, cleaners will not enter your flat for 72 hours after isolation has ended.

After day 10, flatmates 1, 3 and 4 can leave but flatmate 2 with symptoms must remain in isolation.



How long do I need to self-isolate for?

If you are told to self-isolate due to being in contact with a confirmed case

If you are told to self-isolate due to close contact but you have no symptoms yourself, you need to isolate for 10 full days.

Getting a Covid-19 test does not change the need to self-isolate for 10 days.

The rest of your household does not need to self-isolate in this situation.

However, if anyone in the flat develops symptoms for Covid-19 then the whole flat will need to self-isolate.

For on-campus housing, cleaners will not enter your flat for 72 hours after isolation has ended.
