DAMMED questions the paradigm of development that makes a priori assumptions that mega dams are critical to progress. The film follows the drama inherent in the unfolding saga of the Narmada struggle. These are stories of struggle and resilience, despair and hope. The aural texture of the film plays with the folk music, songs of protest and rural soundscapes of the Narmada valley. Narmada becomes a leit-motif and a metaphor for a way of life that was sustainable.
