Allocation of Work for Doctoral Tutors and School Tutors

• Arts and Humanities Schools and Social Science Schools

- 1. Allocated Tasks: the tasks that can be allocated to Doctoral/SchoolTutors are:
 - a. Teaching (face-to-face contact with groups of students): this excludes lecturing but includes small group teaching and seminar teaching and laboratory demonstrating;
 - b. Preparation;
 - c. Supported assessment and marking.
- 2. Preparation and Assessment/Feedback: for each face-to-face contact teaching hour the University would normally expect that a Doctoral/School Tutor will need one-hour for preparation. (Where there is a lot of repeat teaching, it may be that less than this is needed.)
- 3. Where there is an assessment/marking requirement, the University would expect that assessment/marking normally to take another hour for each face-to-face contact teaching hour.
- 4. As a rule of thumb, a weighting of 4 hours would apply to each face-to-face contact teaching hour, to take account of the above, and to include a scheduled group session with students, after the seminar, for queries etc. relating to the seminar.
- 5. Doctoral/School Tutors will not be required to carry out academic advising and therefore will not be allocated what is sometimes known as "Office Hours".
